Plein Air Watercolor Workshop

Materials List

These are the materials I use in my work. (If you are new to watercolor I suggest you purchase student grade watercolors which are less expensive and choose 1 yellow, 1 red, Ultra blue and Cobalt blue and Raw Umber and WN Burnt Sienna). The colors I use are listed below. I prefer Holbein colors with the exception of Windsor Newton brand Burnt Sienna.

Paints I prefer: Holbein

Yellows: Cadmium Yellow Light, Aureolin, Gamboge Nova, Brown Pink

Reds: Cadmium Orange, Cad red light, Rose Madder, Mineral Violet

Blues: Ultramarine Blue, Cobalt Blue, Cerulean Blue, Prussian Blue or Indigo

Greens: Viridian Green, Sap Green

Neutrals: Raw Umber, WN Burnt Sienna, Burnt Umber, Yellow Ocher

Brushes:

I use brushes of varying sizes. To start, you should have 1 large round and 1 smaller round (not too small!!). A good synthetic brush is a good place to start. I use an 8, 12, and 20 for the bulk of my painting. The brushes should have a nice point.

Escoda Versatil Brushes (8, 12, 20) are very good, yet inexpensive brushes that you can get thru Dick Blick

Silver Brush Atelier Quill Series Golden Taklon Brush watercolor are great for large washes and are inexpensive.

Paint Pallet: Any watercolor pallet of your choice is fine but it should have a lid to close when not in use and paint wells suitable for mixing a wash.

Watercolor Pad 140#: Canson or Strathmore 140# watercolor pads will work well. Michaels and AC More both carry them. You will need 1 small pad for studies (7x10) and 1 larger pad for your painting (9x12) (These sizes are just suggestions)

Miscellaneous Items: HB pencil, 1/2 inch wide roll of blue painter's tape, a plastic storage container for water, a smaller plastic (yogurt cup) to set inside it.
