Circle Around - Curves Ahead!

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Description: Create rhythm and movement across your quilt surface by learning how to "draw" template-free curves with your rotary cutter and piece them on your machine, how to make templates for very deep curves, how to stitch quarter-circles with a minimum of fuss, and how to inset circles and other organic shapes in a few fool-proof steps. You'll leave class with a quilt top, a sampler notebook, and total confidence in your ability to piece curves and circles.

FABRIC:

- □ For the quilt top: A selection of fabric of 1/2 to 1 yard pieces These lengths of fabric should contrast with each other in hue or value or both. It would be best if they change hues or values over the surface of the fabric (hand-dyed fabric works well). It's hard to know in advance what you'll opt to use in class, so bring a good selection from which to choose (or to trade!). Feel free to email me for a consult if you're unsure of what to bring.
- □ For the technique samples: We'll be making small samples of a variety of techniques for making circles and curves. You can either cut bits off of the larger pieces you're packing to make your quilt top, or you can make room for 8-10 fat quarters in your suitcase.

OPTIONAL:

- Extension cord
- □ Batting and backing for the quilt top you make; you know yourself. Are you the speedy student who always finishes first? Then you might get to this step. If so, don't forget to pack some sewing machine needles and thread for machine quilting, along with safety pins for basting.
- □ Examples of your work to share (outside of regular class time). I recommend packing a few of these, whether you think you want to share them or not. That gives you the option of changing your mind.
- What makes you happy when you're in a workshop? I've seen everything from a portable sewing table to a special chair to personal listening devices. Whatever makes you more comfortable and able to go for it in class is worth considering hauling along.
